



It has been a busy and productive year in the School Psychology Program! Dr. Tammi Ohmstede returned as the program chair and was excited to add alumnus, Macey Kohls, as Graduate Lecturer. A big thank you to Kyle Heilbrun, Meghan Schneringer, Jessica Shepard, and Danielle Nguyen for covering some classes throughout the year as the program is still down one faculty member.

This year we have five interns who have been working in school districts across Nebraska and one in Idaho. There are four students completing their practicum experiences this year working with school psychologists in Lincoln, Seward, Grand Island and ESU 11. Finally, we are excited to announce that we welcomed sixteen new students into the school psychology program in the summer/fall who are diligently working and learning about the field of school psychology!

We had several students attend the NSPA conference in person and online this year. Congratulations to Amelia Meyer for receiving the 2024 NSPA UNK Student of the Year Award! Three of our second-year students also attended and presented at NASP in Seattle, WA in February.

FAMILY SCIENCE PROGRAM EXPANDS OFFERINGS

The Family Science Program now offers a 6–12 Family and Consumer Science Occupational teaching endorsement for students considering careers teaching FCS in middle and high schools. This new program prepares future educators to deliver Family and Consumer Sciences curriculum and advise FCCLA programming.

The UNK School Psychology Program will soon be launching a new "blended" option for individuals who hold a teaching certificate and have 2 years of teaching experience. This option will allow for teachers to continue teaching and complete the program with only having to be on campus a few times per year. This spring, Samantha Clark and Elizabeth Neukirch have been conducting groups and meeting Bright Future staff needs while simultaneously gaining meaningful service-learning experience to better prepare them as clinical mental health counselors. By all accounts, this partnership has been a win/win for all involved. Since completing his graduate studies, Josh has built a career rooted in student support, leadership development, and community accountability. He began his professional journey as the Assistant Director of Greek Life at High Point University, where he advised fraternity chapters, implemented harm reduction education for the entire Greek community, and managed operations for 12 fraternity and sorority houses and over 60 university owned residential properties.



From there, he joined the University of South Carolina as the Associate Director of Fraternity and Sorority Life. In this role, he continued his work advising fraternity and sorority chapters, expanded leadership development initiatives, and supervised a team of property managers overseeing fraternity and sorority housing.

Josh now serves as the Associate Director of Student Conduct at the University of Kentucky. In this role, he leads the investigation and adjudication of conduct cases involving student organizations, helping foster a culture of accountability, integrity, and respect on campus. He emphasizes collaboration and relationship-building with students, volunteers, and inter/national partners to guide organizations through the conduct process. His approach prioritizes restorative practices that address harm, rebuild trust, and promote long-term success.

Reflecting on his graduate experience, Josh credits his program with developing the foundational skills necessary to build meaningful relationships and support students through complex, often challenging situations. These skills have remained central to his work, allowing him to offer steady, compassionate guidance to students and communities navigating moments of uncertainty, conflict, or need.


